

# Fabric Tissue Holder

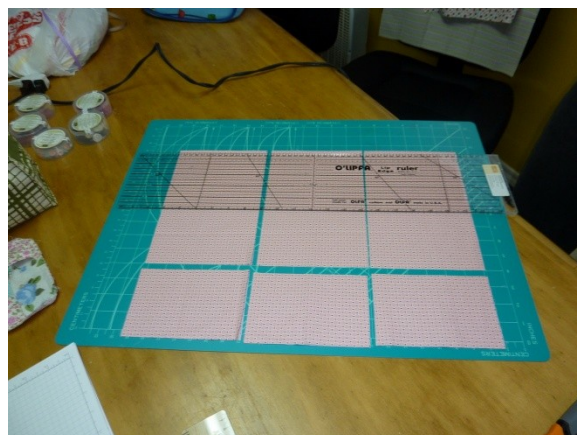
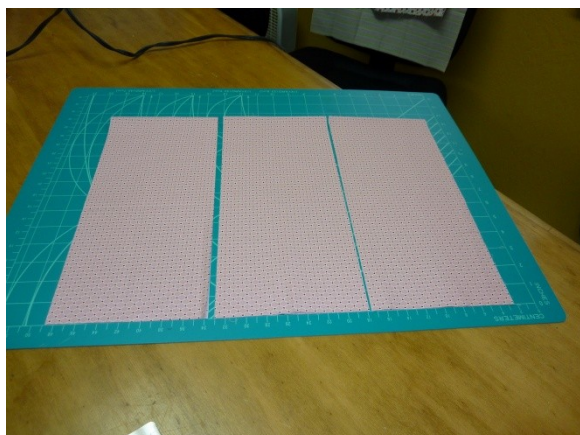
This is a fantastic project to sit down and make a bunch with friends for gifts, door prizes, etc! Four of us worked for an hour and made 12 out of one package of Twitterpated Fabric. It was fast, easy, and fun to visit, cut, and sew! Our holder has a tiny bit of extra room so that all brands of tissues will fit, without being smushed. We had only a small pile of scraps when we were done!

The fabric is sold 3 oversize Fat Quarters to a package. It part of a product suite which means that it matches several other products in the Twitterpated line, like buttons, pleated satin ribbon and Designer Series Paper.



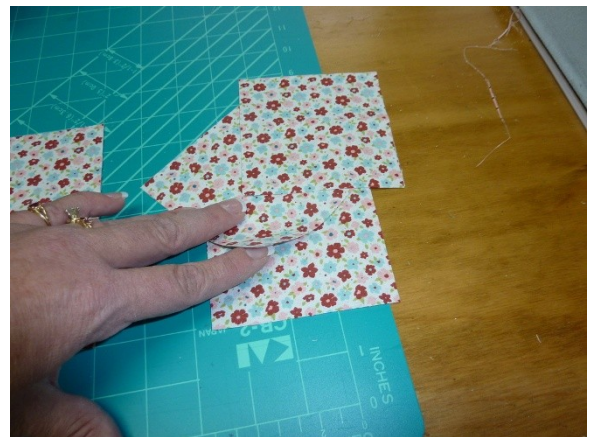
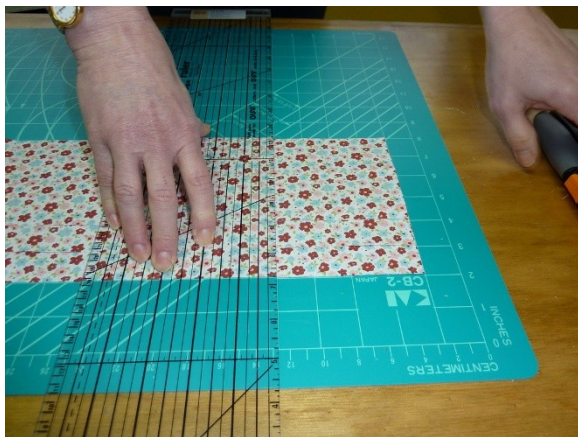
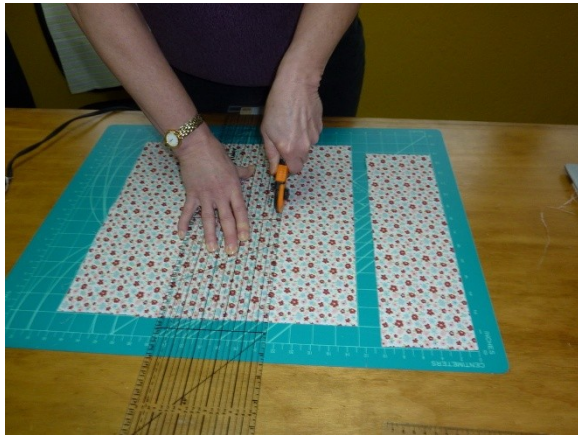
## Instructions:

Begin by laying out your first fabric (remember—it all goes together, so just pick one!), fold in half and iron. Cut fabric into 3 strips, 6” wide, Then cut these strips at 4”



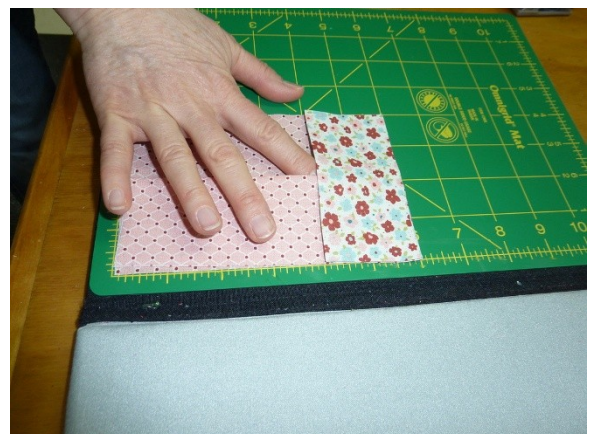
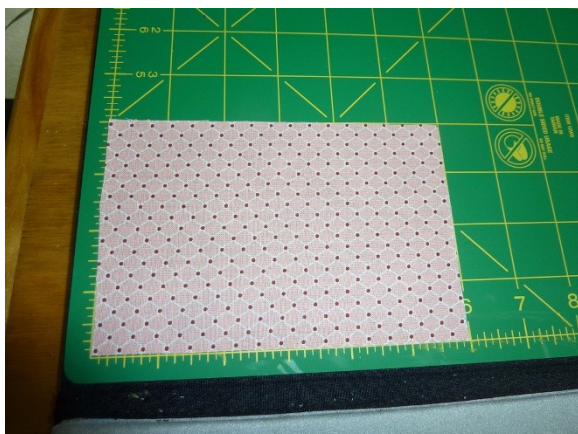
Set aside 12 of these pieces, and take the remaining pieces, fold in half in “portrait” orientation and iron. These will be part of the front flaps of the holder. The remaining pieces will be the back of the holder.

Using the remaining two fabrics. Fold in half, iron, and cut into 4" x 4" pieces. To make it quick—cut into 4" strips, layer the strips on top of each other, then cut to size! Fold these in half, and iron. (the are the short end pieces.)



Now it's time to layer and sew!

- 1) Place back piece (4" x 6") RIGHT SIDE UP on your table
- 2) Add one folded 4" x 4" piece on the end—matching cut ends (fold to center)
- 3) Add one folded 4" x 6" piece over that, again matching cut ends (fold to center)
- 4) Add one folded 4" x 4" piece on other end, matching cut ends (fold to center)
- 5) Add remaining folded 4" x 6" piece on top, matching cut ends (fold to center), then tuck end under end piece (looks like a folded box). Pin at the corners





Sew all the way around. You have leeway here on seam size. A smaller seam will give you more room, if you want a bit tighter fit—you can use a bigger seam. We wanted to be sure we had room for the tissue without squishing, and in case some brands were bigger—so we used a smaller seam.



Once sewed, use your pinking shears, Fray Stop, or zig zag the edges so that it doesn't fray. Turn inside out (poke out those corners!), iron, embellish, and add tissue! (then—make 11 more!)
